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"[Sandy] can do coarse carpenters work, and is something of a horse jockey; he is greatly **addicted** to drink, and when drunk is insolent and disorderly, in his conversation he swears much, and in his behaviour is artful and knavish." - *Virginia Gazette* - Thomas Jefferson 275

"convey in fee simple to the sdT. M. [Thomas Mann Randolph] the youngr. & did convey by deed indentd. bearg date the 15th. day of this present month for his **advancemnt.** a certain tract of land in the county of Henrico called Varina & containg 950. acres with 40. negroes" 374

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"I do not know if he [Bob] has any flesh marks about him. He was  
raised by Mr. Jefferson, at Monticello, in **Albemarle**, who sold  
him to a Mr. Wheat, who sold him to Mr. McKinney of Char-  
lottesville, of whom I purchased him the first Tuesday in last  
month." 238

"I think it most probable he [Bob] is making his way either to **Albe-  
marle**, or the Plantation near Lynchburg. He ran away from Mr.  
Wheat about a year ago, and endeavored to get to Pennsylvan-  
ia, but was apprehended." - Asbury Crenshaw - newspaper  
ad 238

"manumitted, emancipated and set free, and by these presents,  
do manumit, emancipate and set free, a negro woman slave  
named Critty, sometimes called Critty Bowles, the wife of Zach-  
ariah Bowles a free man of colour, residing in the said County  
of **Albemarle**" 242

"On the fifteenth of January, at Monticello, in the county of **Albemar-  
le**; the whole of the residue of the personal property of Thomas  
Jefferson, dec. consisting of 130 valuable negroes, stock, crop,  
&c. household and kitchen furniture." 387

"Ranaway, from his plantation, in **Albemarle**, a negro man called  
JAMES HUBBARD of the property of the Subscriber, living in  
Bedford, a Nailor by trade, of 27 years" - *Richmond Enquirer* -  
Reuben Perry 255

"Ran away from the Subscriber's Plantation, near **Albemarle** Court-  
House, some Time in May last, a Negroe Man named Robin;  
he is a small Fellow, about 30 Years of Age, speaks pretty  
good English, his Legs are crooked" - *Virginia Gazette* - Peter  
Jefferson 236

"Run away from the subscriber in **Albemarle**, a Mulatto slave called  
Sandy, about 35 years of age, his stature is rather low, inclin-  
ing to corpulence, and his complexion light; he is a shoemaker  
by trade, in which he uses his left hand principally" 275

"whoever apprehends the said slave, and delivers him [James Hub-  
bard] to the Subscriber in Bedford county, or into the Jail of  
either **Albemarle** or Bedford, shall receive Forty Dollars in  
addition to what the law allows. Reuben Perry. April 12 [1811]"  
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"Whoever conveys the said slave [Sandy] to me, in **Albemarle**, shall  
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Three Prizes, as follows: Monticello Estate, value at \$71,000/  
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On the 1820 Amelia County map by John Wood, the road that passed by Stony Point Mills was named "Skipwith's Road" as it ran on the other side of the Appomattox River in Amelia County. Wood ended drawing roads and waterways at county lines for the current subject of his surveys. 138

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"[T. J.] doth give grant bargain sell & accordg. to powers in him legally vested doth **appoint** unto the sd M. [Martha Jefferson] & her heirs a parcel of land in the cty. of Bedford containg. 1000. as. be the same more or less, part of the tract of land called the Poplar Forest & at the Westernmost end thereof" 354

"for the further sum of 5/ to him in hand pd by the sd M. & another like sum of 5/ to him in hand pd. by the sd T. M. the elder, & yet another like sum of 5/ to him in hand pd. by the sd T. M. the younger. hath given grantd. bargd. sold & **appointd.**" - to Martha Jefferson Randolph 354

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
